

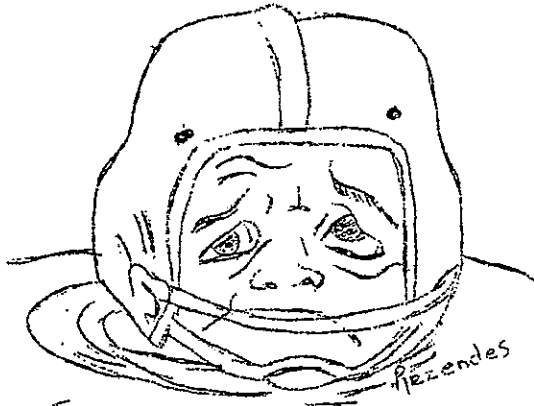

IS DREUX WASHED OUT?

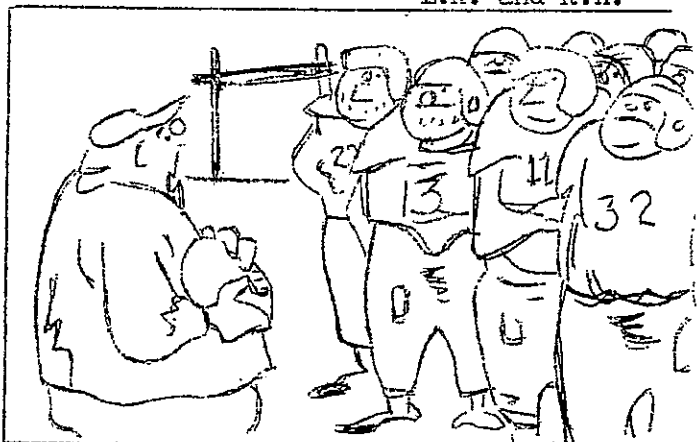
Dreux played Orleans at Dreux last Saturday. This game, as you could say, was rained out with a score of 21 to nothing in favor of Orleans!

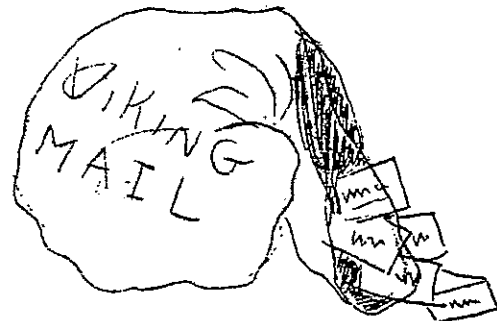
EDITOR'S COLUMN:

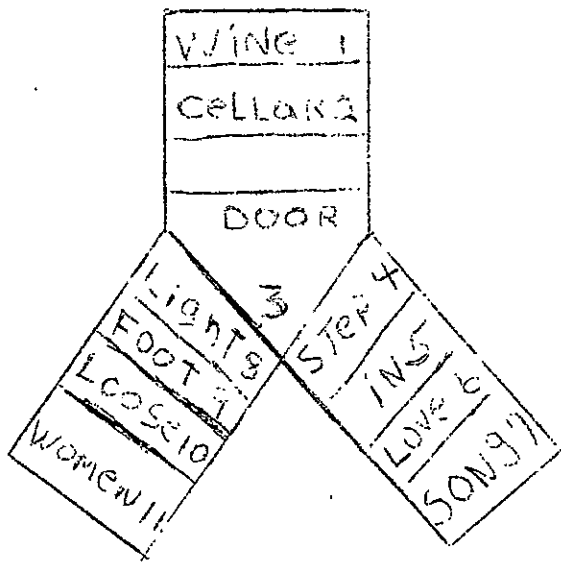

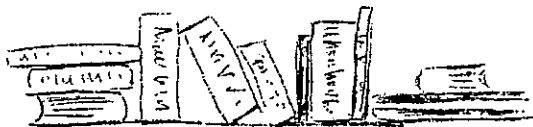

LIBRARY NEWS

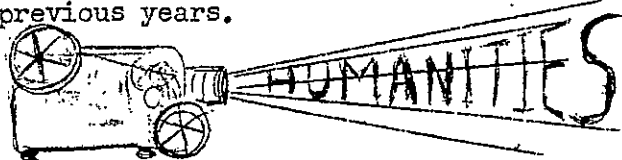

Between the sixteenth and the thirtieth, the book must be returned by the fifteenth of the following month.

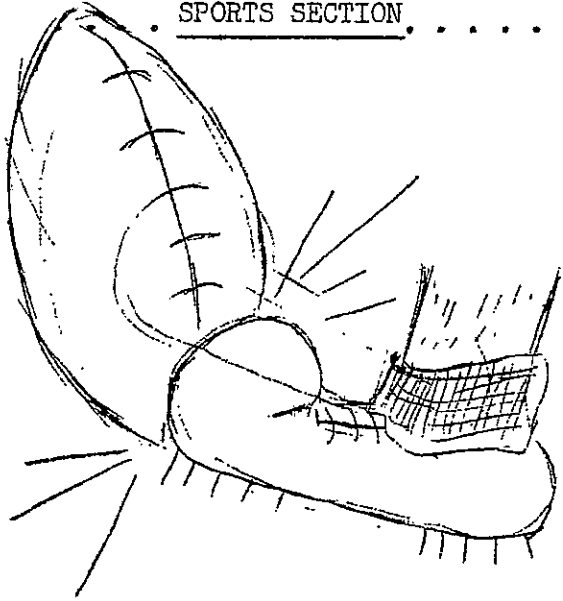

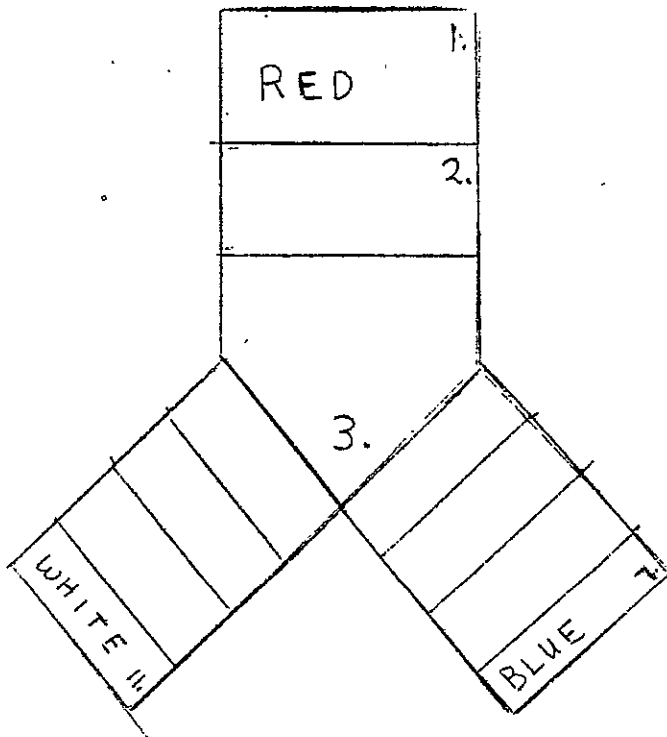
