Proliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test

On ctober 18, 26 Seniors and 23 Juniors here at Droux High School took the F.S.A.T. or Prelimin-ary Scholastic Aptitude Test. This test is given annually, in October, under the direction of the College Entrance Dxamination Board.

Students wishing to take this test were required to register with Ir. Roundtra and pay a few of 50 cents.

Seniors who wish to qualify for certain School arship awards may take this program, thirty sponcors offer i600 scholarships.

Juniors could take the two-hour test as a "practice test" for the College Entrance Examination Board Scholastic Aptitude Test. The latter test is required the senior jerr for admission to most independon't colleges and many state universitier.






