

DREUX BASE PROVIDES NEW LINK IN WORLD WIDE COMMUNICATIONS

Have you ever wondered exactly what all that racket outside the school is about? The answer is: They're building a tower! What kind of tower? At first, it was a real mystery, but now we have some of the answers. Many questions will continue to go unanswered, because that innocent looking structure is 99% classified.

The tower is part of a proposed world-wide rapid communications net-work. This system is superior to radio or microwave, because it is impossible to jam or break into.

There has been considerable talk about the "danger" of climbing this structure, because of "deadly radiation." Now, thanks to Mr. R. B. Forrest, senior resident engineer, a much simplified explanation has been given us. The large, dish-like apparatus are antennas. They emit a sub-harmonic radiation which is dead-

ly to animal tissue. This radiation is below the infra-red scale, that is, invisible to human eyes. The side pointed away from the tower emits a cone of radiation, which can be likened to a rifle shot. The back side emits radiation also, but it is spread out like the shotgun blast. This radiation is quickly diffused, but if one comes within twelve feet or less of the back side, death is assured from the radiation.

The radiation cannot be immediately felt, but in a week to ten days, irreparable internal damage will have been done. The tissue deterioration will continue for about a month, and then....!

Now you have it. Perhaps this has answered a few questions. Let's hope this information has discouraged a few would-be climbers!

LATEST DREUX DEBATE ON ANNUAL . .




At the Teen Club, we have a "pool ladder" that offers regular pool players challenge among each other to obtain recognition of their skill. The chart ranges from 1-11th place.


