

### **FOOTBALL**

#### Dreux 32 - Verdun 19

In the inaugural football game at Dreux, the Vikings handed the Folcons from Verdun a 32-19 setback. The win was sparked by the running of halfback Jerry Hamilton who scored on three touchdown runs. After-touchdown-points by fullback Dennis Brooks, on a twenty-five yard jount, and end Dale Hersey capped the scoring, Outstanding line performances were turned in by Driskill Horton, Tom Pittet, Jim Schou, and Rick Matlick.

#### Dreux 6 - Orleans 13

On a muddy field, the Trojans of Orleans squeezed out a 13-6 win over the Dreux Vikings. The game was a battle of defenses. Dreux's front line, Corley, Schou, Pittet, Martick, Brooks, Hamilton, and McKeehen, starred in tackling, but luck was against the Vikings. By the fourth quarter, Orleans led 13-6. After an eighty yard march, highlighted by passes from Zimmermon to Booty and Hamilton, the Viking's Brooks dove over from the one yard line for the six point gain. Unfortunately, the clock ran out with Dreux behind.

#### Dreux 0 - Paris 12

Paris handed Dreux a heartbreaker to the tune of 12-0. The game was much closer than the scare indicates. Numerous penalties, such as Hamilton's forty yard TD run which was called back, stopped Dreux drives. Dennis Brooks and Mike McKeehen were autstanding on offense, with Pittet, Hamilton, Johnson, Zimmerman, Brooks, Matlick, and Hersey leading the offense.













#### Dreux 32 - Poitiers 19

Gary Zimmerman and Mike Booty teamed up for the two first-half touchdowns. Early in the second half, Gary Zimmerman picked off a Panther pass and skipped down the sidelines for a sixty-five yard TD. From then on it was all Dreux, as Johnson scored twice while Hersey and Brooks added. Hersey and Johnson ate up the field with spectacular runs and the game ended at 32-6 Dreux on top. The Viking defense, rugged as usual, is indicated by the score.

#### Dreux 19 -Chateauroux 2

With the temporary loss of players, Jerry Hamilton and Rick Matlick, Dreux tackled the fired-up Sabres. Although surprised by a first quarter Sabre safety, the Vikings fought back with two TDs by Johnson and Brooks. Zimmerman scored the PAT and the final score was 19-2, Dreux. Dale Hersey added to the all-round brilliance of the offensive backfield by churning off considerable yardage.

#### Dreux 21 - Poitiers 0

Playing their last game in high school, center Tom Pittet, quarterback Gary Zimmerman, fullback Dennis Brooks, and holfbacks Jerry Hamilton, Dale Hersey, and Gary Johnson, fired Dreux to a 21-0 victory over Poitiers in the Viking Homecoming Game. Dreux scored on the first kick-off with Brooks leading the way. In the second quarter, guard Jim Dunlap threw a tremendous block, springing Johnson loose for a 60 yard TD run. Then safety Gary Zimmerman intercepted a Panther pass and fled 60 yards down the sideline for the third Viking touchdown. PATs were scored by Hamilton (2) and Hersey (1). Fine offensive and defensive playing by the line held Politiers scoreless.

The Vikings ended the season with a tie for second place in Com-Z. Dreux American High School has good reason to be proud of their team.

Next the team went to Lakenheath, where the Varsity was beaten 39 to 30 in spite of John Corley's excellent playing.

When Orleans played at Dreux, they proved too much for the Viking's Varsity. Although Rudy Bramlett and Bill Grabowski were hitting, the final scores, with Orleans on top, were 28 to 61 and 37 to 59.


