VIKINGS TIE FOR SECOND PLACE IN CONFERENCE

VIKINGS WIN OPENER

The mighty Dreux Vikings smashed their way into the Com-Z football standings by trouncing Verdun 32-19. Jerry Hamilton, showing his All-Star form, sparked our first - half scoring with two TD runs. Despite heads up ball, the Falcons went ahead 13-12 at the intermission. But coming back before an enthused home crowd, the Vikings of Normandy received the second half kick and marched 65yds. to score on a TD by Dennis Brooks. Also in the 3rd period, Gary Zimmerman's passing arm threw to Dale Hersey what proved to be the winning points as the Red and White took game possession. Inthe last period, Jerry went 55yds. to nullify a last desperate TD by the Golden boys from Verdun.

ORLEANS SQUEEZES BY

As usual, the clouds over Dreux were black, but what befell us that day was a disastrous 13-6 defeat at the hands of Orleans. Orleans, playing with home grounds and a wet field, proved strong against our Vikings. Led by QB Steve Jones, the Trojans scored single tallies in the second and third quarters. A traveling rooting squad totaling 90 strong, witnessed a last period 85 yd.TD march. Dennis Brooks 6points proved that "neversay-die" team spirt.

PENALTIES COSTLY
