AT DREUX

Eileen Joyce Stansbury was born in Cheyenne Wells, Colorado. She spent her childhood there and went to college in her home state. Her undergraduate work was done in the Colorado State University at Greeley and graduate work at the university at Boulder, Colorado.

Miss Stansbury majored in business education and in speech in undergraduate work and in counseling and psychology for graduate work.

Miss Stansbury enjoys teaching at different levels of education. She has counseled at a different school for each of her four years as a guidance counselor. Her first year was at Clark School in the Philippines; next at Bushyhall; then at Ramstien, Germany; and now at Dreux. She plans to go to Ankara, Turkey next year.

Miss Stansbury loves to travel during the summer and has spent many a summer driving around Europe. She was in Spain, Portugal, and Italy last summer. She likes to observe the different customs and peoples.

She enjoys her work here at Dreux and has accomplished an impressive amount of work.

It is the wise student who consults the school counselors about his future education and life plans. The counselor's job is to assist the student in just this sort of planning.

An impressive array of facts and comment on each student in this school is at hand to aid the counselor in advising the student.

The files kept on each student in senior high schools throughout the USAFE Dependents School System consist of the cumulative records or 201 file, health records, attendance records, reports to parents, achievement records, standardized test results, extra-curricular activities, and suggestions and recommendations from teachers on pupils.

Information within the Dependent School System on each student makes it possible to transfer from one school to another with the least possible confusion. And so, even newly arriving students will often find most helpful assistance from the counselors.

But tests, reports and other cold data give only a partial insight into the future. The counselors here at Dreux welcome knowing the student personally and invite individual conferences.

Miss Eileen Stansbury heads the records and filing information and Mr. Charles Johns heads the senior planning group. But both are constantly engaged in discussing with the individual his academic and life plans.

The counseling program here at Dreux was felt directly by every student by the battery of tests which have been thrown at them in the past few months. These tests, for the most part, are given to reflect the achievement level of a student in relation to students from other schools.
