I peered at the plates of salad, which were first in line, but nothing appeared to be drastically wrong so I bravely picked one up. Next I received a plate containing mashed potatoes, cooked vegetables, and a piece of something which vaguely resembled chicken. I mustered up a bit more courage and took one of the sad-looking bananas and two slices of bread, just a little on the stale side.

Once through the line I obtained a glass of cold, white milk, and two pats of damp butter, after fishing in a vat full of water with a pair of tongs.

Once at my table, I recalled again the hideous warnings of my new friends and ardently prayed for survival. Actually as I became absorbed in my meal, I discovered that some vast exaggerations had been made.

The salad seemed very crisp and fresh, as did the chicken, very fresh mainly because the crisp outer-covering was hiding an uncooked bird. Having nothing particularly against rare chicken, I forged ahead to the vegetables, which were hot and very tasty, as were the potatoes. The milk was icy cold, frothy, and delicious, but the banana was a bit bruised for my taste. I completed my first meal here at Dreux, a bit wiser and with no ill effects.

In the past month, I feel that the food has improved greatly, although there are still a few basic problems. First of all, the milk cannot possibly remain cold sitting in glasses on the counter for two hours, and the bread can't remain fresh and dry with butter dripping all over it. Most people like noodles until they are served approximately once a day for a week, with the meat from dinner the night before strewn on top of them. These are only the major complaints that I have about the food here, and, to my way of thinking, they wouldn't be too difficult to remedy.

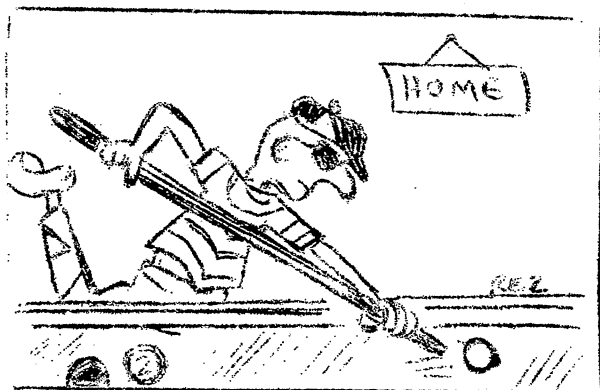
IN OUR DORM

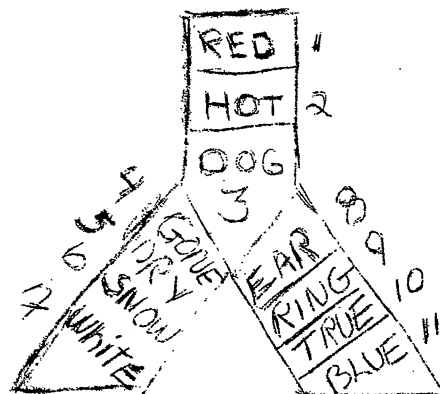
DREUX TO GET BRAND NEW SLOT RACERS
